### **The Everlasting Covenant**

God's last message to the world in Revelation 14:6-12 is a presentation of the "everlasting gospel". It is given in the context of a warning message. A call to repent and "worship Him who made heaven and earth, the sea and springs of water."--Revelation 14:7. This is definitely a reference to the fourth commandment to keep the Sabbath, it's almost a quote from part of that commandment that that gives the reason why it should be kept: "For in six days the LORD made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested the seventh day. Therefore, the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and hallowed it." -- Exodus 20:11

The context of the last gospel message—the three angels' messages—must be given to Christians as well as non-Christians because God's Holy Sabbath has been forgotten by the majority of Christians today. Unfortunately, when the topic of the Sabbath comes up in a sermon, Bible study, or even a conversation with other Christians, the most likely response will be "That's only for the Jews" or "That's old covenant; we are new covenant Christians today.

What is the "old covenant" and what is the "new covenant"? It is important to recognize that the Bible uses the concept of old covenant/new covenant in more than one sense.

First, there is a historical sense in which the use of an earthly sanctuary, sacrifices, and ceremonies which were required before Jesus died were no longer to be practiced because Jesus life and ministry, death, resurrection, and priestly ministry typified by the "first covenant" (old covenant) services were no longer needed. New ceremonies were added by Jesus before His death however—baptism, foot washing, and the Lord's supper.

The second sense in which the Bible uses old covenant/new covenant is experiential. The old covenant ceremonies actually illustrated new covenant realities. Every time an Israelite went to the sanctuary and observed and performed the sacrifices and ceremonies with faith they were being taught the new covenant. And God wanted them to experience the new covenant through this teaching tool.

But what is the "new covenant" experience? The new covenant is the same thing as the "everlasting covenant": the blood of Jesus that provides everything we need to be saved. [Hebrews 13;20, 21]. "New" in relation to God's covenant doesn't mean "brand new." In Hebrew it means "renewed". The "everlasting covenant" is God's way of saving through the blood of Jesus Christ any sinner—from Adam to the last sinner saved. Each time the covenant is presented in the Bible it is a renewal of the same covenant revealed to Adam and Eve in Genesis 3:15. But its clearest expression is Jeremiah

31:31-33 "Behold, the days are coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and with the house of Judah—not according to the covenant that I made with their fathers in the day that I took them by the hand to lead them out of the land of Egypt, My covenant which they broke, though I was a husband to them, says the LORD. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put My law in their minds, and write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be My people. No more shall every man teach his neighbor, and every man his brother, saying, 'Know the LORD,' for they all shall know Me, from the least of them to the greatest of them, says the LORD. For I will forgive their iniquity, and their sin I will remember no more."

This is quoted in the New Testament in Hebrews 8:10-12 to clearly establish what the new covenant really is. Notice the law in the heart is the same for all people.

The new covenant is God fulfilling the gospel promises of righteousness to us through faith. The old covenant is trying to generate what only God can accomplish. Hagar and Sara represent the two covenant experiences. Hagar and Ishmael represent old covenant legalism. Legalism is a self-generated and insufficient obedience that doesn't come from Jesus. Sara and Isaac represent the new covenant of righteousness by faith through grace (see Galatians 4:21-31).

In one sense it really doesn't matter when we live in history—before the cross or after the cross. The promises of the new covenant have been available if we choose them.

In terms of our personal experience, both covenants have the same law. The real question is how do we find harmony with it? How you answer that question will determine whether your experience the new or the old covenant.


